Areas of Achievement

A very warm welcome was received from Mark, Jill and Silvia. A Portfolio has been produced showing all their hard work. This is the first time they have entered S & SE in Bloom RHS It's Your Neighbourhood and hope this is the first of many to come. They have been up and running for three years now. They came together through Transition Cobham. It took them two years to get grants and permission and started growing their first crops in 2016. There is an area to the left when you enter the garden called The Ian Gattem Patch. Ian Gattem is from Elmbridge Borough Council and this area is used by the Children's Centre. Children come and learn how to plant and grow various vegetables and flowers. They use the site on a regular basis. There are vegetable beds growing many things like Potatoes, Hunters Butternut Squash, Strawberry beds all looking in immaculate order. They operate a rotation system and use seep hoses on beds. Money was donated from local businesses and helped to start the Fruit Orchard, fruit trees were also donated by other groups. The Woodland Trust donated the hedging which comprises British Native Trees and is now starting to look well established. There is a flower/cut flower area running along the perimeter fence which is also looking good. The local Free School, Cubs and Scout groups are encouraged to come along and enjoy helping out, they made the Bug Hotel. They participate at the local Farmers Market, selling their produce and their homemade Jam. Composting on site is also evident. Their members who help out on a regular basis can obtain information on planting and a chart to let people know what has been done and what needs to be done, sharing their knowledge and skills. This is a well maintained and very well presented site and wonderful place to come along and learn how to grow a variety of different crops. It has a very vibrant feel about the place. They are doing a wonderful job and may it continue.

Areas for Development

Some permanent signage giving directions from the main road to the Cobham Community Garden. Down pipes and guttering could be fixed to the sheds and more water butts could be installed. The beds could be made longer by reducing the pathway up the middle a little.
